

## Northumberlandia, the lady of the north



In a recent issue of *Sheetlines*,<sup>1</sup> David Andrews described the use by Ordnance Survey of hachures to denote slopes associated with other topographical features. Readers may like this newish example; the human landform sculpture Northumberlandia, on the Blagdon Estate near Cramlington in Northumberland.
